What a busy week we have had in Acorns this week. Reception children have begun

The children then showed me how to write a quality sentence and remember to use capital letters, full stops and finger spaces.

us to showcase our imaginative and creative characteristics.

Our next step will be to round up and down to the nearest 100. It has been an exciting time in Literacy as we have begun our first The Write Stuff paragraph. 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carefully and purposefully created our sentence for each chunk.
